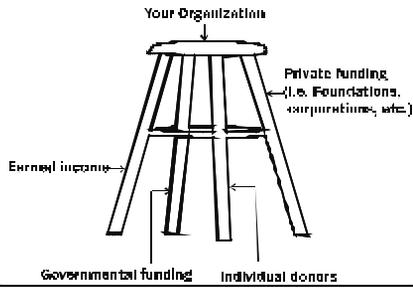

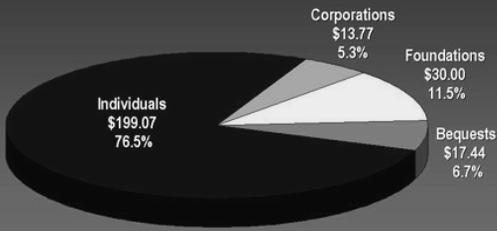
What is Philanthropy?

Securing Your Organization's Financial Stability

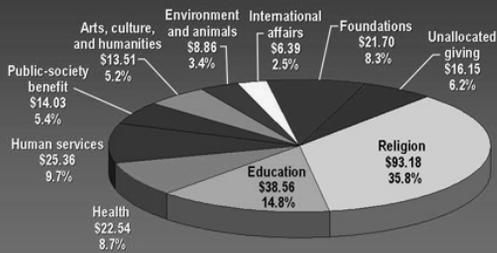


2005 CONTRIBUTIONS: \$260.28 BILLION BY SOURCE OF CONTRIBUTION

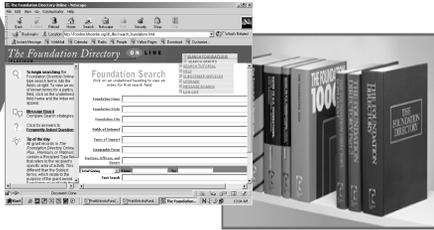
Identifying Funding Sources



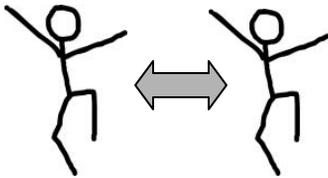
Finding the Match!

- Who funds in my area of interest?
- Who funds in my geographic region?
- Who will provide the type of support I need?
- Who has funded organizations like mine?
- Who has given amounts in the range I need?

Prospect Research

- Identification of and research of individuals who are capable and interested in giving a substantial gift to your organization.

A Likely Prospect:
Has **all three** qualities:

Creating Your List of Prospects

- Begin with those with the closest ties to your organization:
 - Your board and their families and friends
 - Other volunteers
 - Your current and past donors
 - The people your organization serves

Broadening Your Search

- Think creatively.
- Research donors and board members of local and/or similar organizations.
- Use lists of the wealthy, large gifts, top people by profession or industry, state and population group.
- Read, Read, Read!!

- Nongovernmental, nonprofit organization
- Has its own funds or endowment
- Managed by its own trustees or directors
- Established to aid educational, social, religious, scientific, or other charitable activities serving the common welfare

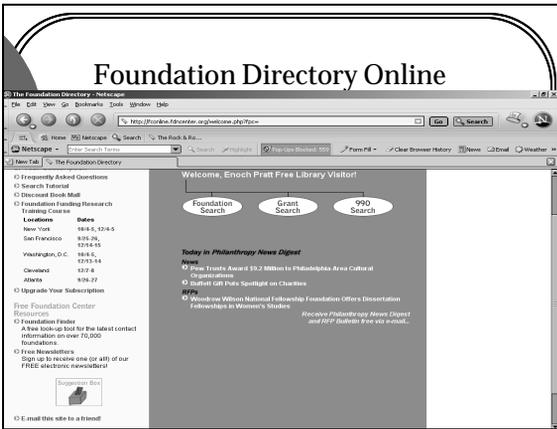

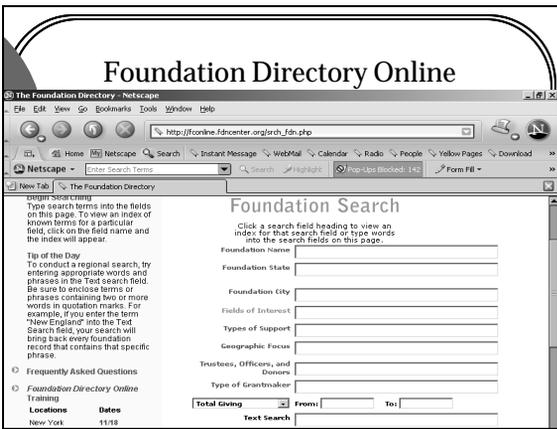
