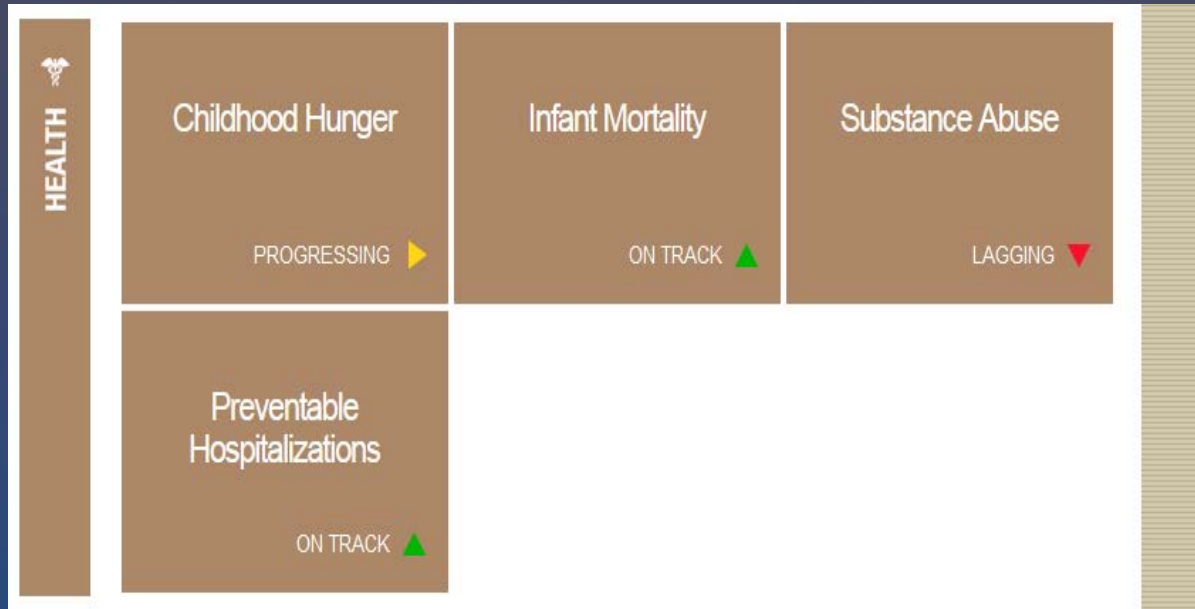


DHMH Federal Grants

Title X Family Planning

- ❑ \$9.9M in Federal and State Funding
- ❑ Ensure Broad Access to Family Planning and Disease Prevention Services for Eligible Individuals
- ❑ Serve women, adolescents and men of childbearing-age



Title X Grantees

- Federally Qualified Health Centers (2)
- Local Health Departments (21)
- Community Health Centers (3)



Effect of Family Planning

- Preconception Health
 - Pre-pregnancy Assessment and Disease Identification
 - Linkage to appropriate Care Provider
 - Management of Chronic Disease and Pre-pregnancy needs
- Planning Reproduction
 - Directly linked to improved educational and economic outcomes for women
- Postpartum Education
 - Provide family planning education and options to encourage birth spacing and improve birth outcomes

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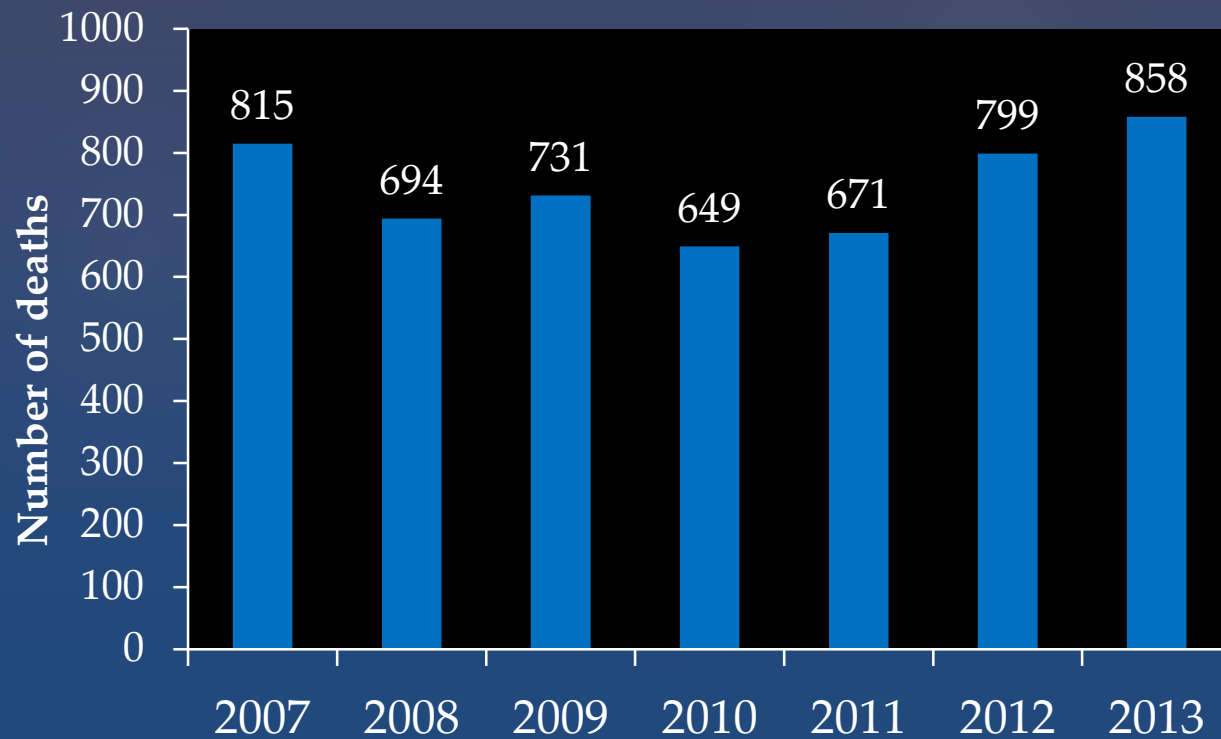
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Total Intoxication Deaths, 2007-2013



Overdose Prevention Initiatives

- Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP)
- Controlled and Dangerous Substance Integration Unit
- Overdose Fatality Review Teams
- Overdose Response Program
- Public Awareness Campaign

Federal funding received from 2011-2014: \$1.7 million

Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP)

- ❑ Secure electronic database with information on the dispensing of Schedules II-V controlled dangerous substances (CDS)
- ❑ Dispensers are required to load CDS-dispensed medications into PDMP within 3 business days
- ❑ Prescribers and dispensers can access data in emergency rooms, physician offices, pharmacies





Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP)

- Healthcare and law enforcement tool
 - Give healthcare providers real time access at point-of-care to patient CDS Rx history
 - Identify aberrant drug use (“doctor/pharmacy shopping”) indicating possible misuse, addiction, or diversion
 - Initiate referral to appropriate assessment, treatment and recovery services
 - Increase confidence in prescribing/dispensing decisions

- Unsolicited reporting
- Patient, prescriber or dispenser-specific reports

Overdose Fatality Review Teams

- ❑ Local jurisdiction teams with stakeholder representation
- ❑ Receive identified OCME data to match with local data sources
- ❑ Confidentiality expectations
- ❑ Three pilot sites: Baltimore City, Cecil County, Wicomico County
- ❑ Now expanded to ten additional jurisdictions



Overdose Response Program

- ❑ Naloxone immediately reverses an opioid overdose
- ❑ 2013 legislation allows for “third party” prescriptions
- ❑ Training curriculum developed and implemented in every jurisdiction starting March, 2014
- ❑ Training family/significant others, law enforcement, fire/EMS, others with reason to need medication



Public Awareness Campaign

- Created a campaign to raise awareness about how to prevent an opioid overdose and treatment availability
- Theme: “Be a Hero, Save a Life”
- Publicized through brochures, emergency cards, Facebook, MTA buses, MVA offices
